The Music Director



Redwood Symphony founder and Music Director Eric Kujawsky is recognized as one of the foremost conductors in the Bay Area. A graduate of UCLA, he established Redwood Symphony in 1985 after receiving his doctorate in conducting from Stanford University. Dr. K has performed with the Palo Alto Philharmonic, San Jose Chamber Orchestra, Aspen Music Festival, TheatreWorks in Palo Alto, and orchestras and choruses throughout the West.

Equally at home with symphony, opera, musical comedy, and jazz, Kujawsky has served as music director for shows by Sondheim, Lerner & Leowe, Cole Porter and others. With Redwood Symphony, he has conducted numerous operas, including La Bohème, Carmen, Candide, Porgy and Bess, and Don Giovanni.

As a conductor, Maestro Kujawsky strives for a clear, expressive, and energetic baton technique and a creative departure from accepted orthodoxies. He has conducted most of the standard orchestral repertoire, including all of Mahler's symphonies and the major works of Stravinsky, Bartók, Sibelius, and Brahms, as well as a large number of contemporary composers, including Mason Bates, John Adams, Corigliano, Daugherty, Messiaen, and Elvis Costello. His pre-concert lectures have become an important part of each performance.

The Assistant Conductor



Kyle Baldwin, our assistant conductor, is also music director for the Rainbow Chamber Orchestra and assistant to the director for the Morrison Chamber Music Center. Baldwin is dedicated to building community by recognizing diversity, fostering inclusion and promoting excellence.

He has a diverse background in conducting that includes symphony orchestras, wind ensembles, opera, chamber ensembles, and dance ensembles. Baldwin conducted the music of Dennis Tobenski with Tobenski singing, and played percussion in the West Coast premiere of Tobenski's piece Only Air. He was instrumental in preparing the world premieres of Andrew Lippa's I Am Harvey Milk and June Bonacich's Concerto for String Trio written for the Little Stars Trio.

The Composer



Kirke Mechem is a prolific composer with a catalogue of over 250 works. He enjoys an international presence, as ASCAP has registered concert performances of his music in 42 countries. Born and raised in Kansas and educated at Stanford and Harvard Universities, Mechem conducted and taught at Stanford, and has served as composer-in-residence at the University of San Francisco. He spent three years in Vienna where he came to the attention of Josef Krips, who later championed the composer's symphonies as conductor of the San Francisco Symphony. In 1991, he was invited to Moscow for an all-Mechem symphonic concert by the USSR Radio-Television Orchestra.

He has been honored and recognized for his contributions from the United Nations, the National Endowment for the Arts, the National Gallery, the American Choral Directors Association, and the Music Educators National Conference. He has received a lifetime achievement award from the National Opera Association and an honorary degree of Doctor of Arts from the University of Kansas.

Mechem's compositions cover almost every genre, but vocal music is the core of his work. His opera Tartuffe, has been performed nearly 400 times in six countries. His extensive choral works have garnered him the title of "dean of American choral composers." The premiere of his dramatic opera based on American abolitionist John Brown was commissioned to celebrate Lyric Opera Kansas City's 50th anniversary. His comic opera The Rivals (an American update of Sheridan's classic play), premiered in 2011 by Skylight Opera.

Redwood Symphony performed Mechem's Symphony No. 2 in 2018 and presented his recent opera *Pride* and *Prejudice* in concert in 2019. The composer was in attendance for both performances

In today's World Premiere of Mechem's new orchestrated version of his suite A Country Fair, we explore the magical power of music to summon mental pictures that are unique to each listener.

The Narrator



Walter M. Mayes is a librarian, actor and director, a professional storyteller, a lecturer on literature for children and teens, an author, a narrator, a Jeopardy Champion (5 games in 1992), and a Master of Ceremonies. He is also the father of a grown son who often says, "As long as you can talk, Dad, you'll have work."

He is the librarian at The Girls' Middle School in Palo Alto, CA, where he has spent the last two decades sharing his lifelong passions for books and theatre. A past president of The Assembly on Literature for Adolescents of NCTE, he has served as a judge for numerous literary awards and prizes, among them the LA Times Book Prize and the Michael L. Printz Award.

As Walter the Giant Storyteller (he really is 6'8" tall!) he has traveled extensively throughout the English-speaking world, often dressed as Hagrid from Harry Potter. A regular feature at Potter publication parties and gatherings, Walter has appeared as Hagrid on CNN and published professionally on the topic of the Harry Potter books and their effect on children's publishing.

He is the author of Walter the Giant Storyteller's Book of Giant Stories and co-author of Valerie & Walter's Best Books for Children with Valerie Lewis of Hicklebees in San Jose.

Walter has acted and/or directed for numerous Bay Area theater companies, including City Lights, Palo Alto Players, Cabrillo Stage, Broadway by the Bay, Sunnyvale Community Players, Redwood Symphony, Foothill Music Theatre, and South Bay Musical Theatre, where he currently serves as Artistic Director.

He was Artist-in-Residence at the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum in Boston in 1997, has recorded books on tape, narrated films, performed on spoken word and musical recordings, and is the inaugural recipient of the Coleen Salley Storytelling Award from Southern Mississippi University.
